We will not be able to resolve the recruitment and retention challenges we're currently facing unless this unfairness is addressed. If the current situation makes you as frustrated as it makes me, we have outlined ways you can help. We have even included a template letter you can send to your local MSP to let them know how unfair you think the situation is.

I'm really looking forward to our **Star Awards** this year which take place in Dundee on the 4th October. We have a superhero theme so brace yourself for photos of some creative and exciting outfits. Once again we'll be livestreaming this on our Youtube channel so as many people can get involved and enjoy it as possible. I'm dusting off my cape in preparation!

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"Very Good" grades for Ayrshire!

Since our last newsletter our Community Support and Housing Support services in Ayrshire welcomed the results of two unannounced visits from the Care Inspectorate.

Between them, the services provide support to 27 adults and children with learning disabilities, autism, and mental health needs in North Ayrshire.

The inspections evaluated two key aspects of the services; "how well does the service support people's wellbeing?" and "how good is the service's leadership?" **Both aspects** were awarded a grade 5—very good.

In awarding the grade fives the Care Inspectorate noted how well the Housing Support services care for people's wellbeing, "This service was excellent at ensuring that people received support that was filled with compassion, dignity and respect. Independence was promoted and there was a real focus on what people were able to do and experience. One person's family member shared, 'they have really turned her life around' and 'she is smiling again'. Staff were recognised for being flexible with their shift times to ensure people could attend activities with their friends. This ensured that people were able to maintain and develop their interests and friendships."

Additionally the Care Inspectorate praised the leadership of the Community Support services and highlighted its strengths in supporting positive outcomes for the people they support, "We found that staff received regular meaningful support and supervision which explored person-centred goals for people supported and staff were encouraged to reflect on their achievements and challenges. The service had a clear overview of this. This allowed staff to reflect on their practice and how it impacts on improving outcomes for people [they support]."

The Care Inspectorate provided an overall summary of the inspection, "People's choice and independence was encouraged and they were able to take part in activities and new experiences. The service ensured people supported were at the centre of their care. People and their families were included."

A huge thank you to our Support Practitioners, Lead Practitioners, Service Leads and Branch admin team, as well as our external partners within North Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership. Most importantly our sincere thanks to the people we support and their families who continue to support us as an organisation!"

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4 steps to Fair Work campaign

Cornerstone is proud to be backing the **4 steps to Fair Work** campaign recently launched by the Coalition of Care Providers in Scotland (CCPS).

The CCPS campaign asks the Scottish Government to take 4 steps that will ensure social care staff in Scotland can experience Fair Work. They are:

- Deal with pay inequality
- Ensure equal pay for equal work
- Value all staff who play their part
- Give us hope of equality

Hazel Brown, Cornerstone Chief Executive commented;

"The 4 steps to Fair Work campaign is an important one, and a campaign that we at Cornerstone fully support. Whilst we were fortunate enough to be able to confirm a improved pay offer with UNISON and colleagues back in May, there is still much to be done in terms of addressing ongoing funding issues as well as pay inequality, fair pay, appropriate recognition and recruitment challenges across the sector".

"It's Cornerstone's ambition to be one of the best employers in social care in Scotland. A big part of that is being able to recognise, remunerate and reward our colleagues appropriately. Paying people fairly, is simply the right thing to do. A well-funded, healthy, social care sector is fundamental to the fabric of Scottish society. The impact our workforce has is huge and they are making an important difference to the lives of people and families across the country every single day. The skills, responsibilities, professionalism and commitment of people working in social care cannot and must not be underestimated and I am hopeful the 4 steps to Fair work campaign will help to shine an important light on all that the social care sector offers".

Survey satisfaction

Thank you to everyone who has completed this year's customer satisfaction survey. All feedback received helps us understand what we are doing well and what needs to improve. The short survey is aimed at a wide range of people from family members, carers, professionals, and of course the people we support.

During the 2022–2023 period we received 136 responses. The majority of people who responded to the survey were family members (71) or a person we support (35)—with the other 30 responses coming from a collection of 'professionals, carers and "other."


Of the 136 responses, 89% answered that they are "completely happy with Cornerstone"—this is a significant and positive increase on last year's percentage of 79%. 10% of people answered they were "mostly happy" with Cornerstone and only 1% of people indicated that they weren't happy with Cornerstone. Some comments include:

"Cornerstone have recently started supporting my brother and he is so much happier and relaxed. This has given me great peace of mind and allowed me to get on with my day without worrying."

"My son and his main Support Practitioner have a fabulous relationship. The Support Practitioner understands him very well and treats him with great respect."

"I'm happy in my flat and happy with the support I get from my staff team."

Of course, it's also vital for us to identify areas we can improve on. Key areas include communication, recruitment/ staff retention and providing better pay for staff—all points that we have taken on board and are addressing.

Overall, the responses show a consistently high level of customer satisfaction and all questions show increased positive results from last year which is very encouraging. It is hoped that as we continue to move forward from the pandemic and achieving our strategic aims that satisfaction will be sustained and indeed further improved next year.

Menopause Awareness Project update



Last summer we were delighted to announce we had been successful in our grant application to the Workplace Equality Fund, allowing us to progress with a Menopause Awareness Project (MAP) in partnership with our project partners The People Portfolio.

With over 78% of our workforce being female, and 45% being between the ages of 35-55, it is vitally important that we better understand the impact of perimenopause, menopause, and post menopause and identify ways in which we, as an organisation, can better support those experiencing symptoms.

To date the project has successfully delivered a number of online and physical resources, introduced mandatory Line Manager Menopause Awareness Training and a Menopause Support Policy which sets out the guidelines for managers and colleagues to provide the right support to help manage menopausal symptoms at work.

"Your Menopause Journey" workshops are specifically designed for women at all stages of the menopause journey and have been delivered across the organisation. Ultimately, the workshop is designed to help colleagues better understand menopause and increase awareness around the range of support available. This workshop will be available to colleagues to watch on-demand shortly. And a Peer Support group, which any colleague can join, has also been set up.

Additionally, we are currently applying for accreditation to be an official Menopause Friendly Employer.

Earlier in the year a number of Cornerstone colleagues, along with representatives from the People Portfolio and Pam Stewart, Deputy CEO Advice Scotland visited the Scottish Parliament to meet with Maree Todd MSP, the then Minister for Public Health, Women's Health, and Sport.

During the course of the meeting the Minister heard all about the Menopause Awareness Project, and commended Cornerstone on their efforts to better support colleagues across the country. She also expressed an interest in hearing further updates, and to exploring future shared learning and resource opportunities once the project nears conclusion.

A Human Rights Bill for Scotland



Scottish Government Riaghaltas na h-Alba gov.scot

The Scottish Government is gathering views to help inform how they will take forward the Human Rights Bill. The Bill will incorporate a range of economic, social and cultural rights into Scots law for the first time, as far as possible within the limits of devolved competence. A new framework will look to incorporate four international human rights treaties into Scots law, including the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD).

Recruitment

Charter for Involvement

The Charter for Involvement is written by people who use care and support services. It outlines how supported people want to be involved in the care that they get, in the organisations that provide their services and in the wider community.

Cornerstone is proudly signed up to the charter and part of this commitment is that we involve the people we support and/or their families in our hiring decisions.

Recently, Peter who is supported by our Rankine team in Dundee joined the interview panel to have his say on who he thought would be a good fit for his support team.

We asked Peter what he enjoyed about this experience and he said, "I liked asking questions and I managed to find two good staff for my team, I got to ask questions and write answers."

Peter's involvement was initiated by Lead Practitioner Erin Torrie who shared, "I really enjoyed having Peter involved in the interview process, although I am looking for candidates who show values and transferable skills and the desire to provide care and support, Peter of course also knows the kind of person he would like to work within his support team. It also gives the interviewees



an opportunity to meet one of the people they would be supporting and to ask them questions directly. It's also really good evidence to show that the people we support are involved in decisions about their care and support, which links with our commitment to the Charter for Involvement."

Talking Mats

For the past few years Cornerstone have been working with Talking Mats—a social enterprise whose vision is to improve the lives of people with communication difficulties.

Together Cornerstone and Talking Mats have developed a resource that will allow anyone we support to be more involved in the process of recruiting their own support staff. The resource will enable the people we support to express what qualities, skills and knowledge are most important to them in a Support Practitioner, and most importantly have their voices heard.

Recruitment Advisor Kerri Bellingham and HR Projects and Research Advisor Debbie Masson set out to create an approach that would directly reflect the National Involvement Network Charter. The Charter was written by people supported in services who state;

"We want to be involved in choosing the people who support us. This includes our support worker, key worker, managers and other staff, volunteers and our advocates. This means we must have the choice to be involved in; writing job descriptions and person specifications, planning interview questions, taking part in interviews and deciding who gets the job."

Kerri, Debbie and everyone involved in the project believe this recruitment resource will "enable us to more closely match the people we support with their ideal member of staff whilst ensuring they have a pivotal role in the process."

Banchory Picnic


